What Will you give your life for?

For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. ²² If I am to go on living in the body, this will mean fruitful labor for me. Yet what shall I choose? I do not know! ²³ I am torn between the two: I desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far; ²⁴ but it is more necessary for you that I remain in the body. ²⁵ Convinced of this, I know that I will remain, and I will continue with all of you for your progress and joy in the faith, ²⁶ so that through my being with you again your boasting in Christ Jesus will abound on account of me. ²⁷ Whatever happens, conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ. Then, whether I come and see you or only hear about you in my absence, I will know that you stand firm in the one Spirit, striving together as one for the faith of the gospel ²⁸ without being frightened in any way by those who oppose you. This is a sign to them that they will be destroyed, but that you will be saved—and that by God. (Phil. 1:21-28 NIV)

What do you value most? Have you ever asked yourself the question, "Is this something I am willing to die for?"

There is certainly something that grabs our attention when a person, confronted with suffering and death, still willingly dies for their beliefs. The price such martyrs pay often stands as a strong testimony of their commitment to someone or something that they considered to be important. Their deaths can even lead others, including those who killed them, to consider more closely what these martyrs stood for.

Yet, as impactful as a martyr's death might be, I think perhaps a greater question for all of us is not so much, "what **would** you die for," but "For what **will** you give your life? It is possible, you could be tortured and executed tomorrow no matter what your beliefs. You might be shot down at any given moment or age for whatever reason. You could die any number of seemingly meaningful or senseless ways between now and when Jesus returns. Yet, whatever happens, one fact remains consistent for us all. We all have a limited amount of time on this earth. So, how **will** you spend the life you have been given?

One day a man named Martin Luther stood trial_before his opponents for what He had written about the Truth and the love of God. It was no secret that many in the room wanted to see Luther dead or silenced. In response to their demands that he submit himself to their will and recant what Luther had discovered to be the truth and will of God, Luther is reported as saying,

"Unless I am convicted by Scripture and plain reason (I do not accept the authority of popes and councils because they have contradicted each other), my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and will not recant anything, for to go against conscience is neither right nor safe. So help me God. Amen."

Or as Luther's collected works, issued later under his supervision, would give the closing words, "Here I stand, I can do no other, so help me God. Amen."

While Luther was not martyred following these words, many people view this as the moment on which much of the reformation and Christianity as we know it today turns. Still, a great deal happened in the life of Luther both before and after this moment. Luther would have great highs and lows in life. Luther would face considerable suffering and persecution. Several people he knew would die for the sake of the gospel. Some of his own children would die of illnesses. Luther's own health would be poor at times, and his work would be filled with conflicts and challenges. Luther mourned as he watched the church, nations, and individuals divided based on his work and how they responded to God's Word. All of this no doubt took its toll. Yet, Luther remained blessed to be able to live out his days, growing in the Lord and proclaiming, the Truth is found through the Word of God Alone, and that we are saved by Grace Alone, through Faith Alone, in Christ Alone, Unlike many others before or after him, Luther was not killed for his faith, but he did give his life to the Lord and the sharing of the gospel.

So what will you give your life to? Will it be earthly popularity, power, possessions, or something greater? Whose will will you follow? Will you try to determine your own reality... or will you put your trust in the one that created the heavens and the earth truly? Will you try to piece together your own version of what you call truth or will you give ear to the one who determines the boundaries of truth itself, and listen to His voice? There are an awful lot of influencers out there trying to gain a following or promote some kind of change. However, I believe that if Luther himself were standing here before us to-day he would say don't just follow me, follow the one who can truly change things for the better and reform us into something good. That one is Jesus Christ alone.

Through his life, death, and resurrection, Jesus gave his life for you and gave life to you. He alone is worth not only dying for but also living for! Standing firm in Christ, we can be confident that whatever time we have been given will be blessed with the knowledge that no matter what happens to us in life, we already know that by the grace of God we will one day live in the presence of His goodness forever. So let us give out lives to the Glory of God, as He reforms the life He has given to us into the image of His Son.
