# **Ongoing Reformation**

Iron sharpens iron, and one man sharpens another.

<sup>18</sup> Whoever tends a fig tree will eat its fruit, and he who guards his master will be honored. <sup>19</sup> As in water face reflects face, so the heart of man reflects the man. <sup>20</sup> Sheol and Abaddon are never satisfied, and never satisfied are the eyes of man. <sup>21</sup> The crucible is for silver, and the furnace is for gold, and a man is tested by his praise. <sup>22</sup> Crush a fool in a mortar with a pestle along with crushed grain, yet his folly will not depart from him. -Proverbs 27:17-22

"This life, therefore, is not godliness but the process of becoming godly, not health but getting well, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not now what we shall be, but we are on the way. The process is not yet finished, but it is actively going on. This is not the goal but it is the right road. At present, everything does not gleam and sparkle, but everything is being cleansed." – **Martin Luther** 

Proverbs 27 might sound like an odd passage to use in relation to the celebration of reformation we do in October. Usually, the Reformation themes center on the fact that we are saved by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ Alone, and that it is by the power of God's Word alone at work in our lives that we are able to know or live out the gospel of Jesus Christ. All of this is true. God's work through those like Luther and his fellow Reformers helped to remind us of that.

Salvation through Christ allows us to look forward to a perfect eternity spent with God. It changes us. Yet, what does that fully visible change look like today, as we continue to struggle with our sin and the world around us? It looks like ongoing reformation!

Some take the idea of ongoing reformation to imply that God's message is somehow constantly evolving, changing to meet the desires and "needs" of a group of people or a particular charismatic leader. Their approach often looks like some of those in the past who decided the best approach to reformation was to: Form your mobs and armies, burn the churches and/or those you disagree with, and make the scriptures say whatever suits your own sinful purposes. All of which you may or may not have convinced yourself is the godly thing to do.

In contrast, Luther recognized that in true Christ-centered, Spirit-filled reformation, God is not the one changing. We are. It is also worth noting that because of this, when Luther shook the world by seeking to bring people back to a fuller understanding of Salvation and what God's Word says and does in our lives, Luther himself was also constantly being reformed as a part of this process. The Luther who wrote and published the 95 Theses for discussion, was a rather different man and theologian from what he was prior and from what he would later become as God's Word molded and shaped him. Luther's work which fills over a bookcase in my office, shows that shaping and reforming that took place, as Luther applied God's word and the ramifications for himself, his family, and those they interacted with, society at large and people's various roles within it, and numerous aspects of physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual wellbeing. All of which are in an ongoing state of struggle and growth for as long as we are in this world.

Proverbs makes it clear that being reformed according to God's perfect will, while desirable, is not always comfortable. Rubbing up against those around us, friend and enemy alike, can produced character, but can be like metal grinding on metal. Looking in a mirror, whether kind or clouded, one can be tough. Our sinful nature hungers for things different, that of the Spirit of God within us, which hungers for that toward which we strive to be and which is to come. The testing of one's mettle can get hot, but the God who we seek to praise with our entire being is worthy of such worship and more! When God seeks to add or remove things from our lives we have to ask ourselves, are we willing to be reformed? When Christ said, "It is finished," the place in heaven for all who put their trust in Him was sealed. Still, for the one who puts their trust in the Lord and says, "Thy will be done," the reformation of their life here on earth has just begun. Such reformation may not be easy, but it is worth it. I wonder, where on the wheel above has God been promoting or reforming you the most right now? Take a moment to pray about it. If you want to share, I'd be happy to do the same.
