Lutheran Schools Week 2022-23

"And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matt 28:18-20)

We often think of the impact that Luther and other reformers had in terms of pointing the church and its people back to the Word of God, so that we might once again understand God's grace, plan, and will for us. However, in order to help people to grow in such an understanding and in their relationship with Him, God also did a great deal of other work through the reformers. Helping give people better access to God's Word meant that unless everyone was going to speak Latin, Greek, or Hebrew, the Bible would need to be translated into other languages, like German. Furthermore, if most people were not going to be limited to having the Bible read to them, then much work also needed to be done to help more people learn to read. Basic literacy rates back then were as low as 5-10% in most places. The wealthy and the priests were often the most literate. Yet even here most of us would be surprised at the literacy rate. We don't want to forget that sharing the faith has powerfully taken place in times and places where written language and literacy have been far less common. However, to try to counter some of the ways in which the church had gotten off track, and to help ongoing generations of church leaders and Christians better improve and maintain their understanding of God's Word, Luther and others recognized, much would have to change and be developed when it came to helping people learn and grow. The Who, What, and, How of education, especially in Lutheran circles, began to change substantially. Writings like Luther's sermon "On the Duty of Sending Children to School," stressed the importance of the connection between literacy and Biblical upbringing or character. Thanks to the development of the printing press, books like Luther's Small Catechism began to help to bring just such education home.

The effects of such work in terms of learning and education were nothing less than profound. Despite some attempts to marginalize or remove Christian influences on education today, many of the educational successes in the United States and other countries can be traced back to values and past efforts made by Christians, based on sound Biblical teaching. These values include:

1. Universal Education: Unlike in previous times, reformers' educational efforts and the schools that followed were not just limited to the wealthy and religious elite. Their schools were the first to educate girls and saw the importance of developing the potential of every child (and adult) for the glory of God. Helping people to be able to educate themselves was also stressed.

2. The Church and Family have the Primary Responsibility for Education: Luther personally started numerous schools in existing churches. Congregations and their leaders were expected to provide the necessary funding and oversight (with possible infrastructure support from the state). Parents were also expected to play an important role in making sure their children attended class and in reinforcing instruction at home.

3. The Goal of Education Is Faith Based, Applied, and Includes Study of the Natural World:

God's place as creator, sustainer, and sovereign ruler of all things, impacted how the reformers approached the study of all topics, not just religion. This world and all the various gifts that God had created for the benefit of mankind, were to be learned about and used just as God intended. A study of the arts and sciences, as seen through the lens of scripture, were considered important to growth and the Christian life.

4. Good Education Requires Gifted Christian Teachers

The Reformers saw the job of the teacher as extremely important. Teachers were expected to be trained in their subject area, theology, and "be of mature and good character." Adequate pay was encouraged both for the sake of the teacher and so that poor students would no miss out due to their own inability to pay.

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From the home to higher education, education at all levels was encouraged to help people carry out their work, civic, and general life in a faithful manner. Encouraging people to serve God to the best of their ability whatever their role, while encouraging them to work and educate themselves toward their full potential as individuals and as a society, lead to what many have called the protestant work ethic. Despite mankind's sinful shortcomings, which are often pointed out these days, God's work and the spreading of His Word through Christian education, have positively shaped Western Civilization for centuries.

During this month of Lutheran Schools week I want to personally thank all of the teachers in our midst, including those that serve in the VCA, our Sunday School, and the various educational institutions in our community. Thank you to all those who serve in financial and other support roles for our teachers and the sharing of the good news of Jesus Christ. Praise God for all of you and for those who have gone before you. May your efforts continue to glorify God and draw you and your students ever closer to Him.
